- The kitchen company Nicholas Anthony has just unveiled its new-look showroom in London's Knightsbridge. Located on Brompton Road, just a short walk from Harrods, it is one of five in Britain (the others being in Ascot, Cambridge, Colchester and Mayfair), features several different room displays and has been designed to fully reflect the company's reputation for luxury, quality materials and ergonomics. - Mindful of how unpredictable a British summer can be, Liberty designed its two man 'Flowers of Liberty' tent to withstand even the sharpest of downpours, so the inside will remain dry no matter what the weather may do during the music-festival season or your camping weekend. It features a multipurpose lobby and a breathable inner tent and, as well as being waterproof, is fire-retardant and UV-fade resistant. - Designers Guild has teamed up with the tile company Bisazza to turn some of founder Tricia Guild's finest botanical print designs into sensational shimmering mosaics. The collaborative collection comprises four reworked patterns from her archive: 'Alexandria', which will transform a wall into a blowsy herbaceous border in full bloom, 'Ardassa', 'Charlottenberg' and 'Charlottenberg One'. - Established in 1907, Pozzoli started out as an antique dealer in northern Italy before expanding into the manufacture of reproduction furniture. Its reputation rapidly grew, and soon it was being commissioned to make pieces for Victor Emmanuel III no less. - Flooring company Sinclair Till has every room in the house covered at its recently opened Notting Hill showroom, which carries an exhaustive collection of carpets, matting, vinyl, Linoleum, rugs and kilims. There is also a corner devoted to the renowned Swedish carpet and rug maker Kasthall Atelier, with which it maintains a close working relationship.
